Residents let down by Labour on Whitehawk Hill

Labour Councillors let down the community by voting SIX TIMES to build on Whitehawk Hill.

Before the last election Labour promised residents at community meetings they would not build on Whitehawk Hill. However less than a year later, Labour brought forward a joint development plan with the Greens to build.

1,620 local residents then signed a petition to save Whitehawk Hill from development, along with local environmental groups lodging a deputation pointing out the ecological value of the hill - but Labour didn't allow it to be heard.

Do not reward Labour with your vote on May 4th as they have let down this community. After 12 years of Labour and Green Councils, it's time for a change.



Only the Conservatives will save Whitehawk Hill from development.

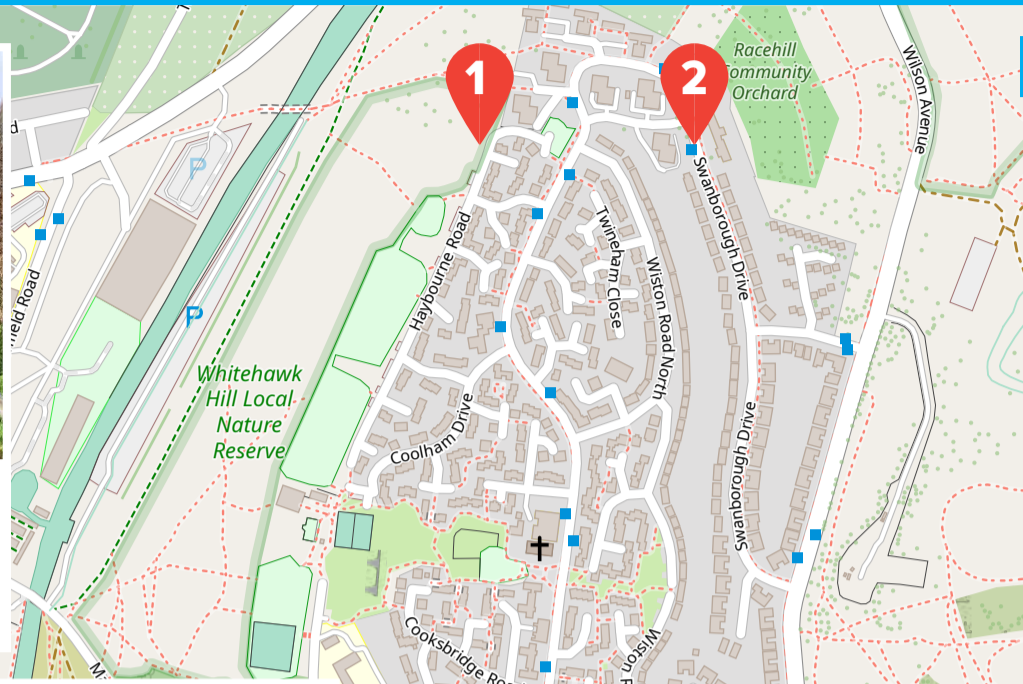

A need for Action in Whitehawk & Marina



1 Labour voted 6 times to build on Whitehawk Hill. The Conservatives led a community petition to Save Whitehawk Hill from development.



2 Council tenants are waiting indefinitely for repairs after Labour's repairs service collapsed and accumulated a backlog of over 11,000 repairs. Labour stopped council estate inspections.



3 Labour banned the use of weedkiller - without putting any alternatives in place. Pavements are blocked and hazardous for the elderly.



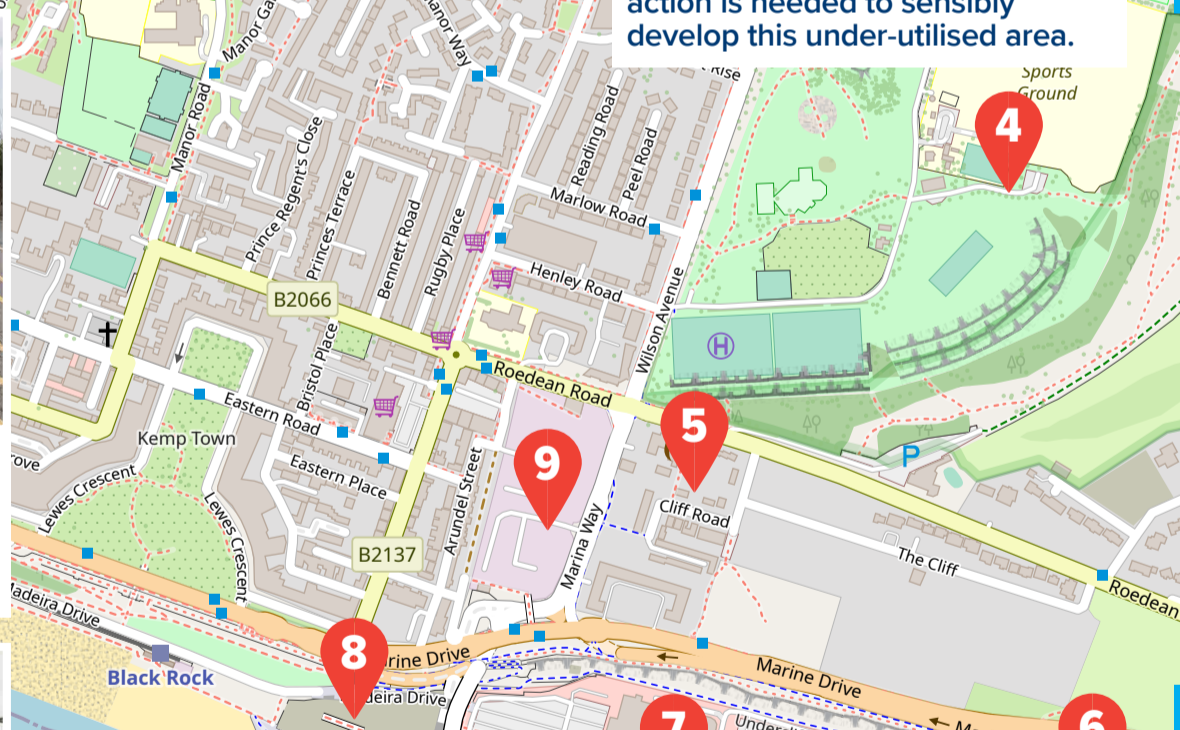
9 Green/Labour Council mishandled the Gasworks brownfield site and upset local residents. Decisive action is needed to sensibly develop this under-utilised area.



4 Labour & Greens introduced a radical homeless policy which allows tents in public parks. Conservatives will overturn this and protect public amenities.



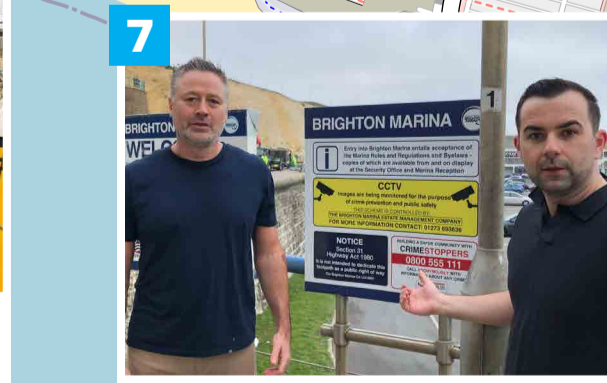
10 Local residents have requested the City Council moves the poorly placed bus shelter to protect those waiting for a bus from the elements.



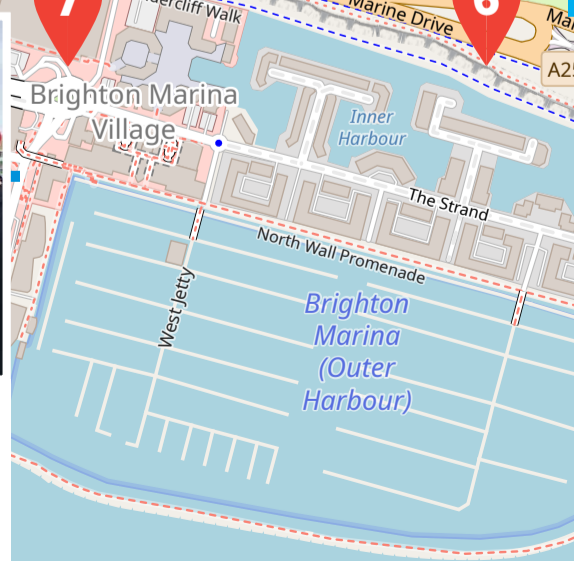
5 Residents have reported 8 weeks of missed recycling collections. After 12 years of Labour and Green Councils, the service is among the worst in the country.



8 The Government provided £12.1m for Black Rock redevelopment, but Council delays have cost residents an extra £3.9m, with no end in sight.



7 The area needs better CCTV and lighting, however Labour declined an invitation to apply for funding. Brighton's funding went to Hastings instead.



6 Conservatives have put forward proposals to upgrade facilities along Undercliff Walk, including bins, toilet refurbishment and path improvements.
